### For whom do we recommend the Kodály Seminar in Rome?

For professional and amateur musicians, music educators and choral musicians interested in Hungarian musical culture and the world famous achievements of Hungarian music pedagogy.

### Why is it worth attending this course?

Through a variety of musical activities including singing, movement and piano performance participants receive inspirational musical experiences as well as practical guidance for the successful implementation of Kodály's educational philosophy in music pedagogy, choral education and in the training of professional musicians.

**The seminar PROGRAMME is free of charge (participation in the professional programme of the three-day course, entrance ticket to the closing concert and coffee and tea between sessions)**

### Seminar Content:

A holistic and singing-based training of musical skills such as rhythm, melody, harmony, form, polyphony, listening, writing, reading, memory, improvisation according to the Kodály Concept. Repertory will include material that can be successfully used in music education from kindergarten till college level. The sessions will involve methodological explanations on the use of the material and various teaching technics.

Introduction to the Kokas pedagogy developed by one of Hungary's most inspiring music pedagogues, the late Klára Kokas, who proved that the Kodály concept of music education is not a closed educational system but it can be complemented by various creative pedagogical approaches. The most distinct feature of the Kokas pedagogy is the free movement improvisation to classical master works or folk music all of which creates a unique opportunity for the development of listening competencies and self-expression.

The voice and piano training sessions are open for all participants and aim at helping students technical and musical development through their own material as well as repertory selected by the faculty.

Professors of the Liszt Ferenc Academy of Music in Budapest founded by Ferenc Liszt and the International Kodály Institute in Kecskemét, Judit Rajk (contralto) and Anikó Novák (piano) tribute a special event to the world famous Hungarian composers, Ferenc Liszt, Béla Bartók and Zoltán Kodály. Although there is more than 70 years between the composers' birthdays, one can recognise a close relationship between Liszt's late compositions (these meditative, religious pieces written between 1875 and 1886), Bartók's modernism and Kodály's impressionism. The program of the concert is based on their common musical language: like a baroque suite, short pieces of music followed each other, without interruption, composing the pieces into one work. Sometimes we can not even discover when one ends and the other starts, even if there is a pause between them. In addition to the late Liszt works, there are Bartók's and Kodály's most significant solo piano pieces and folk song arrangements rooted from the Hungarian folk music tradition in the program.
